The Chueca or Palin:

Degrees to both sides, armed with a club each individual bent on one end, with which it fought a wooden ball that had to be thrown into the attacking Guailpacatun 20 or 40 children, which, placed in a row circular, rapidly spinning to roll over, the strongest resisted, and when tired of one side, turned the contrary Peucoton, was locking up a child in a circle holding hands more, to prevent others rescued or escaped
